Dear Colleagues, Dear Friends of the Institute,

We will complete two major research projects in 2024: The Covid monitor for people in need of care provides insights into the situation of those affected in Bavaria. With its holistic approach, it has provided more perspectives on the pandemic than is often the case. In addition, such a tool may also be able to provide support in future crises.

A study on the treatment of post-traumatic stress in general practice will again raise the question of whether we as general practitioners could and should engage with this at all. We repeatedly demonstrated that we could do so in our previous studies. In view of the fact that up to a third of our consultations are also determined by mental stress, in my opinion, the question of whether we should is also superfluous. Safe and efficient treatment approaches are based on interdisciplinary and integrated concepts. General practice, with its great tradition of "talking medicine", can make a good contribution to this.

But a lot of water will pass under bridges down the Isar from the Alps...and good research is still needed in this field. We are therefore delighted that the first 16 colleagues will graduate from the DFG-POKAL program this fall – but also look forward to the next group of motivated colleagues, as well as to our new professorship for "Mental Health in Primary Care". They all want to support us and our patients with their work.

ADHD: Medical assistants can help

In order to improve GP care for adult ADHD patients, we have developed a short multi-professional brief intervention in which MAs are also involved. The effort involved is low: GPs conduct four sessions of 15 minutes each and the MAs spend 5 x 20 minutes with the patients. Alternatively, the brief intervention can also be carried out solely by doctors (approx. 4 x 30 minutes). The pilot study is sponsored by the WiFoMed e.V.. Exchange on Mental Health with the University of Melbourne

Transdiagnostic mental health approach in the GP office

Patients often show symptoms of more than one mental illness at the same time. As many psychological illnesses are based on similar underlying mechanisms, a more standardized (transdiagnostic) form of treatment may be conceivable. As part of the German Center for Mental Health (DZPG), we will soon be launching the STARC project (STructured, first-Aid geneRic, psychologiCal interventions), in which a transdiagnostic treatment approach will be investigated. Hausarzt-360°-Fireside Chat on Data and Digitization

In December 2023, the head of the Techniker Krankenkasse in Bavaria, Mr. Christian Bredl, visited us to discuss 'Digitization in Healthcare.' In addition to the opt-out system for electronic patient records, low thresholds, avoidance of parallel systems, and timely availability of health data proved to be particularly important. In January 2024, we discussed questions about data quality and Al-based research with Prof. Frauke Kreuter from the Institute of Statistics at LMU. Her conclusion: algorithms also require medical expertise; clinical knowledge is crucial! We thank Mr. Bredl and Prof. Kreuter for the exciting impulses!

Drug-related hospital admissions

Between 2010 and 2020, the prevalence of potentially drug-related hospital admissions with gastrointestinal bleeding as the main diagnosis fell by over a third. In large-scale studies, the researchers are investigating whether depression can be detected earlier and more reliably using a combination of biomarkers and general practitioner heuristics. Digitalization: tablet-based exam

The general medicine exam with 289 students is a logistical challenge every semester: In February, this was done online via iPads for the first time – successfully.
